







## MILLER-HUEBL FUNERAL HOME

In 1973 the Millers purchased Huebl Funeral Chapel in Aberdeen from Bernard and Arlowine Heinz, and Gladys Huebl Smith. It had been established in 1907, by J. L. Huebl, the father of Mrs. Heinz and Mrs. Smith The funeral chapel was operated from the downtown location for the next six years. By that time, the problems of the downtown traffic and the lack of adequate parking space necessitated a new location, and they began construction of the new facility in the fall of 1978 and moved into the completed building on June 30, 1979.

The new solar-heated and cooled facility is designed with an emphasis on energy efficiency, and is completely accessible by the elderly and the handicapped. No Federal or State Funds were involved in the construction of this project. The access to the funeral home is off Main Street, but the building faces South toward 12th Avenue S. E., both to take advantage of passive solar energy and to afford the families being served a greater degree of privacy. The forty solar collector panels are located on top of the Northeast section of the building and the sun's heat collected from them is carried by fluid contained in a system of copper tubing to an underground holding tank, and from there, is pumped through a mechanical system to be the source of either warm or cool air to be circulated throughout the building. Other energy conserving features of this building are that glass is used only on the South side and earth berming is used approximately eight feet up each of the three remaining walls. The building was designed by architect Richard Burns.



The monochromatic color scheme, carried out by the carpeting throughout the building, incorporates rust, chinese reds, and shrimp colors and contrasts with off whites, oatmeal beiges, and woodtones used in the backgrounds. Reception and lobby area shown above.



The emphasis in the interior of the building is on the flexible use of space, and rooms designed to be used for one purpose can easily be used for another purpose if necessary. For example the basic chapel which seats 150 people can be expanded into two of the slumber rooms by sliding a wall back and this increases the available seating to about 250.




